

Reading Part (12 pts.)

Read the following article, in which the writer tells about an activist's mission to Nepal, searching for kids that were exploited by traffickers¹. When you are through with the reading, answer the questions that follow.

The Seeker

1. In the remote villages of Nepal, even natives avoid walking at night, for one might get trapped in the unforgiving mountains of this country for months. Connor Grennan, a 32-year-old Australian activist, had been warned about the dangers he could encounter in the mountains, yet he insisted that he had no other choice. This was not an adventure; it was a mission.
2. Inside Grennan's bag, there was a folder with the photographs of 24 children he had grown to love after volunteering at an orphanage² near Kathmandu, the capital of Nepal. During years of civil war, traffickers had taken these children and many others from remote villages near the Tibetan border and got them to the capital city. While the children's parents thought that they were paying for their sons to be saved from joining the militias, they had unknowingly signed their children up for a life of hard work, or worse, in the nation's capital. Traffickers used to leave the children on the streets to take care of themselves, force them into unpaid work, or sell them into slavery. This very bad condition moved Grennan to try something no one had yet attempted: reuniting the children with their parents.
3. By the time Grennan arrived in Nepal in November, 2004, the civil war had been raging in the country for years. The children he found at the orphanage were the luckiest because their traffickers had agreed to relinquish them to that place. The guy who had "never really been around kids much before" was soon happily devoting his waking hours to the youngsters, who loved to shout his name and pile on top of him, giggling and laughing in high voices. He shared their twice-daily meals of *dal bhat* (lentils over rice) and watched them **lick their metal plates clean**. When there was a bit of chicken to treat, the kids devoured the bones as well. Grennan had never imagined such hunger.
4. On his way to the far northwestern region of Humla, where there were more children to rescue, Grennan hired a translator and two local porters to carry bags of rice and supplies, then set off with nothing but a crude map that guides him to the first village called Ripa. In Ripa, everybody came out and looked at Grennan. He gave the village elders the names of the families he was looking for. The first parents to arrive bought a bag of walnuts and honey to give to the stranger who had news of their son.
5. "I knew the minute I saw them they were Dharma's parents because he looked exactly just like them," Grennan says. Still, he proceeded cautiously, "Do you have a son? What's his name? Whom did you send him off with? When did he leave?" Only then did Grennan bring out the photo of the 10-year-old boy whose parents had given him up at five. "They both burst into million tears."

¹ **traffickers**: people who buy and sell illegal goods, especially drugs

² **orphanage**: a large house where children whose parents are dead live and are taken good care of

6. He offered them the letter Dharma had written them, saying he missed them much. He watched the weeping mother kiss the photo and press it to her forehead like a sacred and holy object. Over the next three weeks, the heart-breaking scene repeated itself, in village after village, until Grennan got to the last child.

7. Many of the families, Grennan discovered, were far too poor to feed another child and hoped their children could continue to be cared for and educated in Kathmandu. Grennan offered to pay the families the transportation fees when they want to visit their new children's home, named Dhaulagiri House. So, the children have become Grennan's main responsibility.
